Food Emporium Coming to Plainsboro

The space vacated by SuperFresh in the Plainsboro Plaza shopping center will soon be occupied by a division of Key Foods known as the Food Emporium. While the exact opening date is unknown, interior work and fit-out of the space is underway. The existing 60,000 square foot space will be downsized to 43,000 square feet to more easily manage products and offerings that will cater to the area's diverse population. In addition to being a full-service

grocer, the store will offer prepared foods for take-out as well as a seating area for store bought products.

"The Township could not be more pleased with the announcement and commitment by Key Foods to establish a grocery store that recognizes the needs and tastes of our residents", said Mayor Peter Cantu.

New Veterans Monument Dedicated

On Veterans Day, Plainsboro Township dedicated a new memorial to honor Plainsboro's nine hometown veterans who have served in the Korean War, Vietnam War and the War on Terrorism. The new monument, which is located on municipal grounds in the Plainsboro Memorial Garden, is a meaningful addition to the collection of markers previously located at the site.

cost to the Township, a large stone from their Kingston quarry which serves as the centerpiece for the memorial.

A plaque affixed to the stone reads *'In Honor And Memory Of Those Township Of Plainsboro Citizens That Gave Their Faithful Service In The Defense Of Their Country To Preserve Freedom, Justice And Liberty For All'*.

"A veteran's memorial has not been established for Plainsboro hometown veterans since the placement of the World War II monument", stated Township Committeeman and member of the Veterans Memorial Subcommittee, Ed Yates. "We are fortunate to now have the opportunity to express our appreciation to those who have served in more recent military campaigns."

The new memorial is the result of a local effort led by Committeeman Yates and longstanding Plainsboro resident and retired US Army veteran Stanley Lapidus, who began actively working with the Township in 2014 on this project. The project began with a short list of possible candidates and from there, a full public outreach campaign was undertaken in an effort to locate all qualified hometown veterans.

Once candidates were identified, screened and their eligibility verified, it came time to design the monument itself. Since the memorial is meant to honor hometown veterans, it seemed particular fitting that the monument be constructed with 'local stone'. Trap Rock Industries, LLC generously offered to partner with the Township on the project and provided, at no

Did You Know?

Did you know that Plainsboro Township has a new Tax Collector?

At their July 13th meeting, the Township Committee appointed Jesse Faasen as Plainsboro's new Tax Collector. Mr. Faasen replaces Lois Burns who retired from the position in August.

Jesse comes to Plainsboro from Berkeley Township where he served as Tax Collector. Prior to that, Mr. Faasen served in the City of Asbury Park as Tax Collector, having been promoted from the Assistant Tax Collector and Director of Sewer Tariffs.

"We conducted an extensive search and several qualified candidates applied for the position. Jesse's experience, enthusiasm and overall personality made him a good fit for the position," stated Mayor Peter Cantu.

Did you know that the Township Committee adopted a Property Maintenance Ordinance?

The purpose of the ordinance is to: provide for public health, safety and welfare; to avoid, prevent and eliminate the maintenance or creation of hazards to public health or safety and to avoid, prevent and eliminate conditions which, if permitted to exist or continue, will depreciate or tend to depreciate the value of adjacent or surrounding residential properties.

The ordinance applies to the exterior of buildings and surrounding yards. Deterioration of a structure and the accumulation of refuse and landscape debris are examples of conditions covered by this ordinance.

Penalties range from a \$100 to \$1,000 fine depending on the frequency of the offense. The ordinance is enforced by the

Code Enforcement, Planning and Zoning, Health and the Police departments.

Did you know that in 2016, Plainsboro Township completed several road projects?

These road projects included Mershon Lane, Chandler Court, Titus Lane, Eiker Road, Brookside Court and Heritage Way. Portions of Scotts Corner Road, Seminary Drive, Parker Road, Grovers Mill Road and the municipal parking lot were completed as well, along with various drainage and catch basin repairs.

Road improvements to Plainsboro Road, from the firehouse to the Community Gardens were recently approved for a Local Aid grant by the New Jersey Department of Transportation. Weather permitting; the road will be paved this year or early in 2017.

Road improvement work, which totals approximately \$1.8 million each year, represents the largest outlay in the capital improvement budget.



Do I Need a Permit for My Project?

Understanding when a project requires a construction permit, more commonly known as a building permit, can be challenging. Plainsboro Township's Building Division within the Code Enforcement Department routinely gets this question from the public.

The rules set forth in the Uniform Construction Code, established by New Jersey's Division of Codes and Standards, include provisions for "ordinary maintenance". Items falling under this specific provision do not require that notification be made to the enforcing agency and also do not call for the issuance of a permit. However, it is important to note that these requirements are subject to change making it difficult to clearly list projects that do not require a construction permit. Additionally, the rules are based on the specific use of the building or structure. For example, a permit would not be required for the replacement of the kitchen sink in a single family dwell-

ing; however, the same fixture replaced in an apartment would require a construction permit.

Under state regulations, N.J.A.C. 5:23-2.7, many items are currently considered ordinary maintenance and can be accessed by the public on the state's website at <http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/codes/codreg/ucc.html>

We strongly suggest that if you are considering any home improvement project, that you contact the Code Enforcement Department at (609) 799-0909 x2545, to speak with our staff and ensure that the work you are proposing will be considered ordinary maintenance or that no construction permit is required. Staff is available to answer your questions and to assist you in ensuring that you remain compliant with all requirements. A Reminder to Use Candles Safely

There have been several residential fires in Plainsboro Township that have been directly attributed to the use of candles. Please be reminded when using candles to:

- Use candle holders that are sturdy and won't tip over.
- Put candle holders on an uncluttered non-flammable surface.
- Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that is combustible.

- Extinguish any candle when you leave the room and avoid using candles in bedrooms or other sleeping areas.

Plainsboro's Snow Removal Practices

Plainsboro Township's main objective during a winter storm is to effectively and efficiently clear the roads of snow and ice. To complete that objective, primary and secondary roads are cleared prior to residential neighborhoods. Standard practice for any storm is to pretreat the roads and begin plowing at approximately three (3) inches. However, since each storm is unique in its length, type and intensity, Plainsboro alters its operations based on the storm.

Plainsboro's roads are divided into two types: primary/secondary roads and residential roads. Primary and secondary roads provide access through Plainsboro, are more heavily travelled and connect the town's neighborhoods and commercial areas. Residential roads provide access within their subdivisions. The exceptions are Dey Road, Scudders Mill Road and Schalks Crossing Road; they are maintained and plowed by Middlesex County.

During a winter storm, Plainsboro's Department of Public Works (DPW) begins first clearing the primary and secondary roads. Keeping them clear is essential for emergency

vehicles to travel through town. Once they are clear, DPW staff begins working on residential roads. A storm that is lengthy and/or has heavy accumulation often requires DPW crews to leave the residential roads and return to the primary and secondary roads. Once the roads are clear, DPW staff clears the bus stops and certain walkways.

Snow and ice removal is not solely the town's responsibility. Residents are required to clear snow and ice from the sidewalks abutting their property within 24 hours of the storm's completion. The snow cannot be placed in the paved portion of any street where it can hinder the passage of pedestrians, bicyclists or vehicles.

"Keeping our roads clear during a winter storm is no easy task, but our dedication allows us to consistently provide the best service possible," states Township Committeeman David Bander.

Good Tree Health – What You Should Know

Tree maintenance is a responsibility that Plainsboro Township does not take lightly. This dedication helped Plainsboro achieve its designation as a Tree City USA for 31 consecutive years. Responsibility for maintaining trees does not rest solely with the municipality; residents are also required to maintain their trees.

Typically, if a tree is situated 15 feet or more from the curb, it is located on private property and property owners are required to remove any overhanging branches and limbs that interfere with the use of a sidewalk. "Best Management

Practices" recommend that the lowest branch overhanging a sidewalk should be at least eight feet from the ground. In order to help residents understand how to properly maintain their trees, the Shade Tree Advisory Committee provides a Tree Maintenance Guide. Understanding Pedestrian Safety

Pedestrians have a greater chance of being injured or killed by a car in New Jersey than any other state in the nation. The state addressed this problem by passing the pedestrian safety law. The law requires motorists to come to a complete stop and remain stopped for pedestrians in a crosswalk. The pedestrian law specifies:

- The driver of a motor vehicle **MUST STOP AND REMAIN STOPPED** for a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk, but shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except at crosswalks when the movement of traffic is being regulated by police officers or traffic control signals, or where otherwise prohibited by municipal, county, or state regulation, and except where a pedestrian tunnel or overhead pedestrian crossing has been provided. But, no pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.

- Whenever any vehicle is stopped to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass such stopped vehicle.
- Every pedestrian upon a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway.

Motorists who fails to observe the law may be subjected to one or more of the following: two points and/or \$200 fine (plus court costs) and/or 15 days of community service and insurance surcharges.

Pedestrians who fail to obey pedestrian signals and do not use crosswalks at signalized intersections may be fined up to \$54.00.

“The Plainsboro Police Department is committed to educating drivers and pedestrians about this law to ensure the safety of our citizens”, stated Deputy Mayor Neil Lewis.

The Public Safety Communication Officer's Role in Law Enforcement

The role of the Public Safety Communications Officer (PSCO) in a law enforcement agency is a crucial one. The PSCO is the first person that a member of the public encounters when contacting the police department. It is important that a PSCO maintain his/her professionalism and composure in order to correctly record all information received from each caller. This information must then be accurately relayed to responding officers, which is especially important in high stress situations. Plainsboro's PSCOs are responsible for dispatching police, fire and emergency medical services throughout the Township. The PSCO monitors multiple radio channels at one time, including state and county frequencies, to properly communicate with necessary personnel. There are many different areas of responsibility and a variety of functions associated with a PSCO. Multi-tasking, prioritizing and attention to detail are essential job functions. Prioritizing for the PSCO is imperative given that often times, many incidents can be happening simultaneously. The PSCO must determine which incoming phone call takes priority based upon information provided by the caller or, in some cases, multiple callers.

When a call is received on either the non-emergency line or via 911, the PSCO determines the nature of the problem, and the appropriate resources to deploy. After an initial dispatch to the appropriate units, the PSCO continues to maintain radio communication with them. PSCOs will provide additional assistance or information to the responding units as requested. All of the Plainsboro Township Police Department's PSCOs are certified in Emergency Medical Dispatch. This certification enables the PSCO to provide pre-arrival medical instructions

to aid the patient until help arrives on scene. Giving pre-arrival instructions over the phone can be very challenging at times for a variety of reasons. The complicated nature of a medical call, the lack of information that is provided or even a language barrier all need to be sorted out and overcome by a PSCO. For example, a PSCO could be providing a family member, who is extremely upset; lifesaving CPR instructions to aid their loved one. The PSCO is tasked with not only keeping control of the conversation and calming the family member, but also providing clear life-saving instructions to follow while they await the arrival of emergency medical services.

On a daily basis, our PSCOs works closely with law enforcement officers, firefighters and emergency medical services to help ensure the safety and security of Plainsboro Township residents.

Pet Licenses

NJ State Law mandates that all dogs six months and older must be licensed annually by the Township. Licenses are due for renewal by January 31st with penalty charges beginning on February 1st. Applications for dogs and cats are available from the Township Clerk's Office and the Township website. See box, at right, for animal licensing fees. Failure to license pets is in violation of Plainsboro Township's Ordinance 59-1 and can result in a summons. **According to state regulation N.J.A.C. 8:23A, when licensing, the rabies vaccination immunity must extend through at least ten (10) months of the 12-month licensing period. Licenses cannot be issued if the rabies vaccination expires before November 1st of each year. If for any medical reason the animal cannot be vaccinated in the required time, form VPH-28 must be completed by the veterinarian and submitted with the renewal form.

Vital Records

The local registrar is responsible for maintaining vital records of births, marriages/civil unions, domestic partnerships and deaths that occurred in Plainsboro Township. The municipality that holds the original record is the only registrar, besides the State Registrar, that can issue a certified copy.

A Certified Copy of a vital record is issued to those individuals who

have a direct link to the individual(s) named on the vital record, as identified in the Governor's Executive Order 18, and provided that the requestor is able to identify the vital record and can provide proof of his identity and relationship.
