Plainsboro Announces Drug Recovery Assistance Program *Key Stakeholders work together to provide assistance for those in need*

Now, more than ever, drug use and addiction is a major national, state and local problem that impacts us all on multiple levels. Individuals, families, and communities bear the many ill-effects that the crisis has imposed on our safety, health and the economy.

In response, Mayor Cantu, the Plainsboro Township Committee and the Plainsboro Police Department are implementing a new program; Community Addiction Recovery Effort (C.A.R.E.). The C.A.R.E. initiative is a network of community stakeholders who will facilitate education, prevention and improve access to treatment and recovery support for those struggling with drug addiction. The program ensures help for those seeking assistance without fear of arrest or prosecution.

According to Mayor Peter Cantu, “Our loved ones affected by addiction must have a way to seek assistance and obtain it. Strengthened relationships between the community, its leaders and the police department allows the C.A.R.E. program to assist people in need, reduce crime, and build a better community”.

The Plainsboro Police Department will work to remove the stigma associated with addiction and implement recovery as part of the investigation and arrest processes. According to Plainsboro Police Chief Guy Armour, “In addition to ensuring victim restitution and the filing of appropriate complaints, we will begin screening arrested individuals for participation in the C.A.R.E. program and match individuals with a certified recovery coach who will serve as a personal guide and mentor to recovery”.

Access to the recovery mentorship program is completely voluntary and offered to all persons suspected of suffering from any drug or alcohol addiction. In addition, Court proceedings will be postponed during the recovery process and the police will monitor the individual’s overall recovery progress. Before starting the referral initiative, staff from Recovery Advocates of America, (a non-profit organization) will meet with indi-

viduals at the township to share their stories of addiction and recovery.

“The Plainsboro Police Department is fully dedicated to the health and safety of the community by educating our officers as an additional step in furthering this initiative. We empathize

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with addiction and view it as a disease rather than a crime”, Chief Armour said. The program was designed at the request of the Plainsboro Township Committee. The police, Mayor and Committee met with community leaders to discuss the need for such a program and how best to approach it. Meetings were held with addiction recovery specialists, police officers and faith based organizations including the Princeton Alliance Church, First Presbyterian Church of Plainsboro, and the Queenship of Mary Church. Other meetings were held with the Princeton Medical Center at Plainsboro, the West Windsor-Plainsboro School District, Recovery Advocates of America, and the Plainsboro Municipal Court Judge and Public Defender.

At the start of the 2017-2018 school year, Lieutenant Fred Tavener and Juvenile Detective Scott Beatty of the Plainsboro Police Department launched the #NotEvenOnce opiate and addiction education program at West Windsor-Plainsboro High School North as part of the senior health class. #NotEvenOnce focuses on educating young adults about the path to addiction and the associated warning signs so that they can make safe and responsible decisions during their final

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New Development Activity Progressing

The Township continues to experience robust development activity in the new year that will add benefits from varied housing types as well as commercial type construction,” stated Township Committeeman Ed Yates. The following projects are underway or will soon be under construction.

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Riverview is located within the hospital’s Redevelopment Area between Merwick and Firmenich. Construction is underway for this 305 unit active adult community that will consist of 260 apartments and 45 townhomes with recreation amenities and dining opportunities. There will also be thirty-seven apartments set aside as affordable units.

Princeton Forrestal Village Residential is located within the Forrestal Village adjacent to College Road. This 394 unit apart-

ment complex will feature smaller units to appeal to the millennial generation as well as empty nesters looking for a downsized lifestyle while still living in Plainsboro. Fifty of the units will be set aside as affordable units. The development will consist of three separate buildings with parking decks constructed internally to be hidden from view.

The Place at Plainsboro is a rental development consisting of 100% affordable units located on Dey Road just past the Princeton Crossing neighborhood. The two phase project will consist of 70 units initially with the balance in phase two. Site preparation work is underway.

Lifetime is the large building seen along Scudders Mill Road near the entrance to US 1. The 120,000 square foot health and fitness center is accepting members and is expected to open in mid-2018.

Beacon II is a new 40,000+/- square foot companion medical office building across the street from the existing facility located on the corner of Forrestal Road South and Campus Road. Site work is underway and construction is expected to take about one year.

Township Committee Reorganizes for 2018

On January 2nd, the Plainsboro Township Committee held their annual reorganization meeting. Mayor Peter Cantu was sworn in to serve on the Township Committee and moments later he was elected by a unanimous vote to serve as Mayor for the 38th year. Neil Lewis was then selected to serve his 20th year as Deputy Mayor.

In his annual remarks, Mayor Cantu highlighted the importance of the Township’s financial stability, noting that Plainsboro’s AAA bond rating from Standard and Poor’s was re-affirmed in 2017. Mayor Cantu also acknowledged that planning has begun for Plainsboro’s Centennial celebration to take place in 2019.

Regarding Plainsboro’s economic development, the Mayor spoke about the implementation of the affordable housing development called The Place at Plainsboro, provided a status of long-awaited State Department of Transportation improvements for Route One, and preparations for an update to the Township’s Master Plan (to occur in 2019).

On the public safety front, the Mayor spoke of the development and implementation of a new drug assistance and recovery program called C.A.R.E. (see article on page 1). The Mayor also discussed the Plainsboro Police Department’s success in obtaining reaccreditation through the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police. Finally, the Mayor discussed the impending change in command upon the retirement of current Chief Guy Armour in the coming year. The recruitment process for a new Chief will be underway in early 2018.

Other notable items included preparation for the 2019 Road Maintenance Program, the renovation of the historic Wicoff House and grand opening in 2019 and the many popular programs and events offered by the Township’s Recreation and Community Services Department.

Mayor Cantu thanked his fellow Committee Members for their dedication and tireless support to continue to make the Township a great place to live, work and raise a family. He stated “2017 was a good year for Plainsboro on several fronts and while 2018 will offer many new challenges, I am confident that with the continued support of an outstanding group of employees, professionals, and citizen volunteers, 2018 will be an even better year”.

Planning for Summer Camp 2018

Camp registration will begin on Thursday, March 1, 2018. Residents can either register online from the Township website at www.plainsboronj.com or stop in to the Recreation and Cultural Center for assistance during business hours, Monday – Friday, 8:30 am – 4:30 pm as well as Tuesday and Thursday from 6:00 – 8:00 pm. Camps are open to West Windsor and Plainsboro residents and children of Plainsboro-based business employees. Camp season starts June 25, 2018.

Recreational Arts, Inc. will offer camps for children entering grades 1-9 which will encompass acting, singing, and dancing. “Think Summer” – Register Your Public Pool Early

Plainsboro Township has more than sixty registered public swimming pools and spas that are inspected annually by the Code Enforcement Department. Many of these pools are located outside and are targeted to open for the season in time for Memorial Day weekend. Many people look forward to this ceremonial ‘start of summer’, but it is important to understand the requirements for opening a public pool and the delays that can result from poor planning.

Plainsboro has an ordinance (Chapter 88 of the Township Code Book) that lists the technical requirements for public swimming pools. Pool registrations must be filed each year with the Code Enforcement Department by March 31st. This enables the Department to ensure that by the time the pools open to the general public, all appropriate inspections have been conducted. Inspections are performed by the Health Officer, Electrical Subcode Official, and the Fire Official. Additionally, there is an electrical bonding & grounding certificate that is provided as a result of an independent electrical inspection. This certificate is valid for five years, and is kept on file in the Code Enforcement Department. Once all inspections are approved the Code Enforcement Department issues a Certificate of Compliance that is valid for one year.

A recent article published by the State’s Division of Codes & Standards indicated that some pool equipment may need to be retrofitted in order to comply with today’s code requirements.

“One thing that public pool operators should ensure is that the pool’s pump is GFCI protected”, stated Brian Miller, Director of the Code Enforcement Department. “The other challenge we face every year when inspecting the public swimming pools is trying to accommodate the inspection requests in a very short timeframe”, stated Brian Miller, Director of the Code Enforcement Department. “Despite the information our office sends out in February to the various Associations and Property Management companies, the majority of our inspections are performed in the two weeks prior to the holiday weekend. Owners/managers should register early for an inspection to ensure the public pools are safe and that they can open on time.”

Environmentally Friendly Lawn Maintenance

Maintaining a healthy lawn in an environmentally friendly manner is not difficult, but requires a change of thinking for most people. The following information provides assistance for those interested in making this change.

The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) recommends keeping the height of a lawn between 2 ½” – 3 ½” high. Keeping the grass at this height shades the soil, cools the roots and prohibits weed growth.

A healthy lawn does not require the overuse of chemicals or water. Research shows that grass clippings can provide up to 25% of your lawn’s total fertilizer needs. When grass clippings decompose they deliver nitrogen and other organic material

to the soil. As a result, you can annually decrease the amount of fertilizer used on your lawn. A common myth about grass mulching is that it creates thatch; this is false. According to the NJDEP, thatch is formed from the accumulation of dead roots and stems. Therefore, instead of bagging your lawn clippings, mulch them.

“Grass mulching and efficiently using water allows residents to protect our environment”, states Township Committeeman David Bander. Residents interested in grass mulching can contact the Rutgers Cooperative Extension, New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station at 732-398-5262. year of high school and beyond. Officers of the Manchester Police Department in Ocean County, New Jersey developed the curriculum and certified ten of our officers to present the material in Plainsboro. Plainsboro Receives Traffic Safety Grants

In 2017, the Plainsboro Township Police Department's Traffic Safety Division succeeded in obtaining six separate traffic safety grants, totaling over \$50,000. Grant funds are dedicated to traffic safety education, equipment, and enforcement. All education and enforcement efforts are in addition to regular police services and are intended to enhance the safety of the Township.

The *Distracted Driving Crackdown Campaign (U-Text U-Drive U-Pay)* was the first grant in 2017. April is National Distracted Driver Month, which is a time to remind New Jersey motorists of the State's distracted driving laws. From April 1st-21st, Plainsboro police officers conducted approximately 100 hours of special enforcement patrols targeting distracted drivers.

Between May 22nd and June 4th, police departments nationwide participated in the *Click It or Ticket* seat belt mobilization. Plainsboro police officers conducted special enforcement patrols for all violations of Title 39 of the Motor Vehicle Code. The main focus of these patrols was to stop motorists who were not complying with the State's seat belt laws. Officers also enforced child safety restraint laws, as appropriate.

The *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over Statewide Crackdown* consisted of two campaigns, the first took place around Labor Day and the other coincided with the end-of-year holidays. Impaired driving remains a significant issue, both in New Jersey and nationwide. Alcohol impaired fatalities account for approximately 30% of New Jersey's traffic fatalities. Between August 18th and September 4th, and again between December 8th and January 1st, Plainsboro police officers conduct special enforcement patrols targeting impaired drivers. These grants provide approximately 200 hours of additional DWI patrols.

The Plainsboro Township Police Department has joined with police from around the State in implementing a comprehensive pedestrian safety program involving *Education, Enforcement, and Engineering*. Between July 1, 2017 and June 15, 2018 the Plainsboro Police Department's Traffic Division is coordinating a campaign consisting of three components: The

Education component involves getting the pedestrian safety message out to all members of the community through local meetings and events. The Enforcement component involves directed police patrols at high-volume pedestrian locations within the community. These patrols are designed to target both motorists and pedestrians whose actions put pedestrians at risk. The Engineering component explores traffic engineering improvements such as enhanced crosswalks, signs, and signals, such as the recent addition of retro-reflective stop sign posts in many locations throughout the Township.

In addition, the Plainsboro Township Police Department secured a Federal grant through the *Division of Highway & Traffic Safety* in the amount of \$16,500, dedicated to DWI enforcement. These grant funds were dedicated to 300 hours of comprehensive DWI enforcement, including both roving patrols and checkpoints. The grant allowed the Plainsboro Township Police Department to schedule enforcement efforts on and around every major holiday and at other times identified as having higher probabilities of intoxicated driving.

The grant application processes ranged from standard Q&A format to detailed traffic safety statistics and analysis. Grants were awarded based on demonstrated need and past performance by the department. Each grant requires detailed reporting of education and enforcement efforts and justification for associated costs.

As a result of attaining these grants, Plainsboro Township has seen nearly 1,000 hours of traffic safety enforcement over the course of one year, in addition to regular patrol. "These grants allow us to dedicate additional manpower to traffic safety issues we normally would be unable to offer. I'm extremely proud of the efforts put forth by our officers, both in attaining these grants and in conducting the education and enforcement. Their dedication and professionalism is paramount to maintaining and enhancing pedestrian and traffic safety in Plainsboro," stated Chief Guy Armour.

Atkinson joined the Department in March of 2015 after achieving a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Centenary College and successfully completing the Mercer County Police Academy. Assigned to the Patrol Division since his date of hire, Ptl. Atkinson was recog-

nized for his exemplary service, commitment to excellence and dedication to Plainsboro Township and its citizens.

Deputy Mayor and Police Liaison Neil Lewis stated, "We congratulate Ptl. Atkinson on his recognition after only three years as a Plainsboro Township police officer. He has proven himself to be a professional and enthusiastic member of the department. I have no doubt that he will continue to meet new challenges and advance his career."

Pet Licenses

New Jersey State law mandates that all dogs six months of age or older be licensed. Applications are available for all new pets in the Township Clerk's Office at 641 Plainsboro Road. Proof of rabies vaccination must be submitted with the application. **According to state regulation, when licensing, the rabies vaccination immunity must extend through at least ten (10) months of the 12-month licensing period.** Therefore, licenses cannot be issued if the rabies vaccination expires before November 1st of each year. If for any medical reason the animal cannot be vaccinated in the required time, form VPH-28 must be completed by the veterinarian and submitted with the form. Submit a copy of the spay/neuter certificate, if applicable. The license fees are \$13.20 for spayed/neutered animals

and \$16.20 for non-neutered animals. Late fees of \$5.00 per month are assessed as of February 1st.

If you missed the Township Rabies Clinic in November please contact the Middlesex County Public Health Department at (732) 745-3100 for the listing of the county scheduled clinics held in the surrounding municipalities.

Brush Collection Guidelines:

- Must be curbside by 7:00am the first Monday of the month designated for your street ONLY. No brush should be placed in the street or on sidewalks and no closer than 10' from any catch basin.
- Brush left curbside during non-scheduled months is subject to fines and removal costs.
- Trimmings from trees, shrubs and vines accepted (max. 6 feet length and 5 inches diameter).
- NO trash, roots, stumps, soil, grass and leaves.
- Brush shall be neatly placed parallel to the road with limb ends facing the same direction.
