"Follow this simple rule: if a battery is rechargeable, it's recyclable," stated Committeeman Bander. "Rechargeable batteries are accepted for recycling at the Department of Public Works facility and during Plainsboro's bulk waste events."

Did you know that there is a bicycle sharing station at the Plainsboro Public Library? The station is operated by

Zagster, a company specializing in bicycle sharing. The concept of bicycle sharing is to rent a bike for a small fee for up to two hours. You can return the bike to where you picked it up or dock it at another Zagster-operated location such as the Forrestal Campus or any of the several locations in Princeton. Once you download the app to your smart phone all of the rental and station location information is at your fingertips. The station at the library was made possible by a grant from the NJ Council on Physical Fitness & Sports. Zagster is a Massachusetts-based market leader in bike sharing, operating 200+ programs in 35 states, making bikes available to more than 6.5 million people every day.

Princeton Forrestal Center Celebrates 45 Years!

It's a sign of the times. Princeton Forrestal Center (PFC) celebrates its 45th birthday as a thriving citizen of Plainsboro and is giving itself a facelift in the form of new monument signs. Sleek, sophisticated, anodized bronze, internally illuminated signs will replace the current signs that have announced PFC to the rest of the world for more than four decades. The messaging is clear – PFC intends to build on its past successes to continue to achieve the present and future as a vibrant, forward-thinking corporate office and research complex that has a real appreciation of its host community.

PFC, Princeton University's corporate office and research campus, has been an economic powerhouse in the region – bringing an annual \$7.3 billion dollar economic impact while occupying one-third of the municipality's land area. This quintessential mixed-use development with over 10 million square feet of development on 2,200 acres, features academic, research, office, residential, hotel, conference center, retail uses – and nearly 500 acres of managed open and recreation space.

Today, PFC is home to over 225 for-profit and not-for-profit corporations and attracts some of the most prestigious companies in the world, many of which have located their North American corporate headquarters in Plainsboro. The appeal of the PFC is due to the collective energy and wisdom of developer Princeton University and the leadership of host community Plainsboro. The University is world-renowned for the very highest standards in teaching and research and for the beauty, creativity and social responsibility of its academic campus in Princeton. Plainsboro, a municipality renowned in the state and perhaps in the nation for its financial and political stability, can boast visionary land-use planning and an unwavering commitment to the welfare of all its residents.

Coincidentally, or maybe one can say it was meant to be, PFC shares its 45th birthday celebration with Plainsboro's Centennial celebration in 2019. And another upcoming 45th anniversary celebration relates to municipal leadership. Plainsboro Mayor Peter Cantu in 2019 will be celebrating his 45th year on Plains-

boro's Township Committee, and 39th year as mayor. He has had a crucial voice in and eye on PFC's development – always with the vision of doing what is best for the Plainsboro community in terms of fiscal strength, academic excellence, environmental responsibility, and ethical and humane social values.

"The partnership with Princeton Forrestal Center over the decades has been gratifying, because even though we occasionally may disagree on details, Princeton Forrestal Center's basic development values have always been in sync with Plainsboro's," said Mayor Cantu. He noted that Plainsboro's strategic planning vision has guided the municipality's other nationally renowned economic development projects in the community – most noteworthy being the \$1.2 billion 171-acre healthcare campus that transformed an underutilized industrial area into a vibrant health services region.

"We have worked very hard to plan for the balance of economic growth, while keeping open space preservation as a key goal. The results are evident with world-class corporations and healthcare facilities with excellent services such as our schools, library, town center, Plainsboro Preserve, all focused on our residents' quality of life. That focus will continue," said Mayor Cantu.

Within the past year, Princeton Forrestal Center enhanced Plainsboro's reputation as the place to be with the openings of LifeTime Fitness and the Princeton Innovation Center Biolabs, a bio-technology entrepreneurial support hub. In addition Integra Lifesciences announced it is moving to PFC in 2019.

Energy Aggregation Program to End December 2018

Plainsboro's current town-wide community energy aggregation program (PCEA) will end December 2018.

The Township awarded a 21 month contract to TriEagle Energy for residents participating in the program. The rate was approximately 18% lower than the PSE&G tariff price for electricity saving participants approximately \$300 over contract term, with no change to the level of service. The program operated very successfully during the contract period.

The Township recently went out to bid again with the hope of continuing the program after TriEagle Energy's contract expired. Two qualified bidders responded but the Township had concerns about their price due to market and regulatory volatility. According to the Township's CEA consultant, Gabel Associates, volatility should lessen in the coming months and the Township and Gabel Associates will continue to monitor the marketplace for an opportunity to bid again, probably during the first quarter of 2019. Healthy Eating Promoted at the Library

Grant money from the New Jersey Healthy Communities Network has been used to create a healthy eating laboratory on the third floor balcony of the Plainsboro Library. The money was used to purchase planter boxes, soil, hand tools, seeds and plants to grow healthy eating choices in the form of vegetables and herbs.

The children's floor of the library was chosen not only because of the sun's orientation, but so that children could witness how the plants grow and produce edible and nutritious food. Growing the plants in planter boxes also demonstrates that almost any outside area of an apartment balcony, deck, or small yard can be used to grow healthy food.

Darren Miguez, Head of Youth Services for the Library, has spearheaded the effort to get the project up and growing and has also incorporated the edible gardens into programs such as *Green Smoothie 101* where various crops were used as ingredients to make smoothies which the children were allowed to sample.

Township Committeeman, Ed Yates commented on the success of the program by acknowledging that, "about half of our housing stock consists of apartments and condominiums, so demonstrating how to grow healthy eating choices this way shows it can be done almost anywhere."

Why Homeowners Need Building Permits

When considering making improvements or renovations to your home, it can be tempting to try to circumvent the permit process. Unfortunately, when you try to sell your home, the absence of permits can prove to be a real problem. Buyers may balk at purchasing a home that does not have permits out of fear that the work was either done improperly or in an unsafe way. Securing proper permits after the fact can also add another level of unnecessary stress during an already stressful time. In the end, getting required permits at the appropriate time is always a good idea.

Homeowners sometimes ignore the permit process because they don't want the hassle of filing the necessary paperwork, or paying the permit fees on top of project expenses. They may also be concerned that their property taxes will increase. There are many projects that fall under *ordinary maintenance*, meaning that they do not require a permit or minor work which means the project can begin prior to the issuance of a permit. It is important to note that obtaining a permit for regulated work today is much easier than trying to resolve an issue for a past project when selling your home. The various codes that the department enforces will sometimes change requirements, so having the work inspected and approved at the time it's done is very important. Knowing that all safety rules and standard building practices were observed gives buyers peace of mind. Part of the permit process is intended to verify that the improvements to a home were made properly, according to the regulations, and by someone who knows what he or she is doing.

"If anyone tells you that you will save time and aggravation by skipping the permit process, they are wrong", stated Township Committeeman Ed Yates. "If you obtain required permits for necessary home repairs now, you will be happy you did when it comes time to sell your home."

Summer Camp Jobs Available

Presidential Volunteer Service Award Program

The Presidential Volunteer Service Award (PVSA) recognizes volunteers who have achieved either the required number of hours of service over a 12-month time period, or cumulative hours of service over the course of a lifetime.

Individuals, families and groups that meet the criteria are eligible for the PVSA. There are several different requirements that a person needs to meet in order to be eligible to earn this award.

- Recipient(s) must be a United States citizen or a lawfully admitted permanent resident.
- Awards are issued for service hours served within a 12-month time period or over the course of a lifetime.
- Awards are issued for volunteer service only; additional levels of participation with the organization (i.e., charitable support) are not a factor considered for the award.
- Court-ordered community service does not qualify for the award. Awards are issued by approved certifying organizations.
- Service must be with an approved certifying organization that is legally established in the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico or one of the U.S. territories.

Last year, Pritika Sharma, a junior at West Windsor-Plainsboro High School North and a Plainsboro resident, approached us with her goal of earning the highest level award for her age group - the Gold Award. In order to accomplish this she would have to earn 250 or more volunteer hours. As to what inspired her to take on this challenge, Pritika said "I already volunteered for the Plainsboro Recreation and Community Services Department and I loved it! I observed people turning their passions into achievement and I wanted to do the same. Working for Plainsboro was something I looked forward to

every day so I decided to commit to what started as a hobby. With a little research I found a goal that would take me to the next level - 250 hours for a presidential volunteer award. After putting a plan together with Tara, the Environmental Educator at Plainsboro Recreation, I was ready to start my service."

Throughout the summer, Pritika volunteered for the Plainsboro Recreation Department helping with a variety of programs, camps, and administrative tasks. Her plethora of knowledge, willingness to support the Department and overall positive attitude was an asset this past summer. "This young lady is a true inspiration to her peers", stated Township Committeeman Nuran Nabi. "I cannot think of anyone more deserving of this award."

Tavener Appointed Chief



The Plainsboro Township Committee has selected Lieutenant Fred Tavener as Chief of Police, effective February 1, 2019. Tavener will succeed Chief Guy Armour who has served as Chief since October 1, 2011. Armour will retire after 25 years of distinguished service to Plainsboro Township. The Township Committee extends their gratitude to outgoing Chief Armour

for his excellent service to Plainsboro.

"Lieutenant Tavener's disciplined leadership approach has allowed him to set expectations of integrity and accountability in all aspects of the police department. He is a committed leader who takes great pride in community outreach and engagement to identify and solve problems affecting our citizens and businesses of Plainsboro," stated Deputy Mayor Neil Lewis, who serves as Township Committee liaison to the police department.

Tavener joined the Plainsboro Township Police Department in 1997 when he began his career as a patrol officer. In 2001, he was assigned to the Traffic Division where he became involved in various traffic improvement initiatives. Tavener was then promoted to Patrol Corporal in 2005, and Patrol Sergeant in 2007. In 2010, he was assigned to supervise the Traffic Division where he implemented numerous community and traffic improvement programs. In 2011, Tavener was pro-

moted to Lieutenant where he has provided leadership, vision, and structure for the Special Services Division, including the Detective and Traffic Bureaus, and served as Internal Affairs Commander. In 2018, Tavener was instrumental in developing and implementing the Community Addiction Recovery (CARE) Initiative that provides education, prevention, and treatment for those suffering from drug addiction. He has also served as liaison to the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office for internal affairs investigations, annual drug testing, forfeiture reporting, pursuit reporting, and use of force reporting.

Tavener earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Administration of Justice from Rutgers University in 1996. In 2013, he returned to Rutgers to complete the Certified Public Manager program. He then went on to attend Fairleigh Dickinson University where he earned a Master of Administrative Sciences Degree in 2014.

"Lieutenant Tavener has provided exemplary service to Plainsboro Township for the past 21 years," stated Mayor Peter Cantu. "His promotion to Chief will insure the relationships built between the police department and the community will continue to flourish."

Vital Records

The local registrar is responsible for maintaining vital records of births, marriages/civil unions, domestic partnerships and deaths that occurred in Plainsboro Township. The municipality that holds the original record is the only registrar, besides the State Registrar, that can issue a certified copy.

A Certified Copy of a vital record is issued to those individuals who have a direct link to the individual(s) named on the vital record, as identified in the Governor's Executive Order 18, and provided that the requestor is able to identify the vital record and can provide proof of his identity and relationship.

Pet Licenses

NJ State Law mandates that all dogs six months and older must be licensed annually by the Township. Licenses are due for renewal by January 31st with penalty charges beginning on February 1st. Applications for dogs and cats are available from the Township Clerk's Office and the township website.

Failure to license pets is in violation of Plainsboro Township's Ordinance 59-1 and can result in a summons. **According to state regulation N.J.A.C. 8:23A, when licensing, the rabies vaccination immunity must extend through at least ten (10) months of the 12-month licensing period. Licenses cannot be issued if the rabies vaccination expires before November 1st of each year. If for any medical reason the animal cannot be vaccinated in the required time, form VPH-28 must be completed by the veterinarian and submitted with the renewal form.
